Pupils show the true meaning of Christmas with Shoe Boxes

With the help of their parents, a total of 161 boxes were collected, which shatters the previous school record of 105!

ARM provide education, medical care and a church for the poor, for refugees and







- •Collect paper used only on one side to be used as scrap paper for art etc
- •Print only the pages that you need by using the print selection function.






